Definition of Peer Pressure:

A feeling that one must do the same things as other people of one's age and social group in order to be liked or respected by them.

There are several different types of peer pressure:

Positive Peer Pressure

When people in your social group pressure you to do something that is in your best interests.





Practicing hockey slap shots to beat your friend.

Negative Peer Pressure

When your social group pressures you to do something that is not in your best interest.

Example



Lying to your parent about where you are.

Example



When that pressure or encouragement comes from something around us. Usually this is what is actually said to us.

Example



A friend says, "Everyone else is having a smoke. Have one if you want to fit in with us."

Internal Peer Pressure

When that pressure of encouragement comes from something inside of us.

You think that you have to like a certain movie because all your friends have a T-shirt with the movie's main character on it.
